CALL TO WORSHIP

Crosses of palm unite us in our devotion to Jesus of Nazareth, and focus our gaze on the King, the Lamb, the Son of God.

On the way to Calvary, palms were waved to honor the King.

Rejoice greatly, O daughter of Zion! Shout aloud, O daughter of Jerusalem! Behold, your king comes to you, triumphant and victorious is he, humbled and riding on a donkey, on a colt, the foal of a donkey.

On the way to Calvary, palms were waved—response to One who came to suffer so.

He was despised and rejected by others; a man of suffering and acquainted with infirmity; and as one from whom others hide their faces he was despised, and we held him of no account.

On the way to Calvary, we take up our crosses, and watch this One who rides toward death and life eternal—one King, one Lord, one death—for all!

PRAYER OF THE DAY

When our arms have grown weak from the burdens we carry, you take them from us, and strengthen us with your mercy. We empty ourselves so you might fill us with grace.

Voice of Wisdom: when death hovers so close we can feel it's cold breath, you come to us, the warm breath of resurrection pushing aside our fears. When we hesitate to walk into the unknown stretching before us, you tightly clasp our hands and teach us the first step. We empty ourselves so you might fill us with peace.

God in Community, Holy in One, we open our hearts to you, as Jesus came to open your way of living to us. On this day when we celebrate the joy he brought to the lives of those who heard him speak, as we celebrate the hope he offered to those whom he healed, as we celebrate the infinite patience of the Trinity, we come to worship Jesus, the King riding on a donkey, triumphant and gentle, present and awaiting.

Lord of all, we come to lift our voices with those who sang your praise as you entered into the final days. We also do not know what is coming next, although you offer us signs and voices who see our lives as we cannot. Bless us as we honor you, most holy God, Father, Spirit. **Amen.**

Jesus was handed over to the powers of this world. In all nations, instruct the powerful, that they would not exploit their power but maintain justice. Sustain soldiers, and guide those who command them, that they serve those in greatest need, led even so by a spirit of peace. Hear us, O God. **Your mercy is great.**

On the cross Jesus joined all who feel forsaken. Abide with those who are condemned to death. Defend those who are falsely accused. Console and strengthen those who are mocked or bullied. Accompany all who suffer especially we pray for our members Rolland, Donna, Walli, Betty, Ron, Gloria and Gene. We pray for our friends Donna, Denise, Bill, Dawn, Dorothy, Stephani, Karla, Orin, Danielle, Krista, Betty, Charlene, Meghan and Matt let us pray that Christ our healer transform sickness into health, loneliness into companionship, bereavement into consolation, and suffering into peace. We pray for those serving in the military including: Alex, T.J., Ben, Vicki, Jeremy, Luke, Miranda and Daniel. We pray for seminarian Kaylie Ines. Grant respite and renewal. Hear us, O God. **Your mercy is great.**

We continue to pray for all those affected by the virus including those who have contracted it, those who care for those suffering, and those who continue to research and seek the best resolutions for the virus and the health of society.

Wider Church by Jeanne Ahlers

On March 12, President Biden signed the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021. Its passage was shaped by input of many constituents, including Lutheran voices. We can celebrate the supports funded for millions of Americans who are still struggling with the COVID-19 pandemic. The federal response means a family has rent for another month, food on the table, required medicine, and for many, the chance no longer to live in poverty and hunger.

Many individual, leadership and coalition actions emphasized ELCA federal priorities for advocacy action. On the domestic front, economic realities were addressed by payments of up to \$1,400 per person and \$2,800 per married couple whose yearly income was below \$75,000 or \$150,000 respectively, COVID-19 vaccine funding and continued contract tracing will take some \$55 billion. And the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants and Children (WIC) received \$3 billion to invest in nutrition services for pregnant and postpartum women, infants and children under age five.

The Plan addresses home energy by providing \$4.5 billion for the Low-Income Housing Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP), and another \$500 million for drinking water and wastewater assistance. Comprehensive housing needs stemming from the pandemic's impact are addressed by roughly \$50 billion, including \$10 billion for homeowners facing foreclosure and \$27 billion for renters facing eviction. All this will proactively prevent the looming mass-eviction crisis, It's a significant win for congregations and shelters already exceeding capacity.

Internationally, Congress included nearly \$11 billion for COVID-19 relief. These funds help low- and middle-income countries mitigate further spread of the coronavirus, and support them in addressing health, humanitarian and economic needs.

All this is indeed reason to celebrate. Of course there is still much to be done. But with our continued support, we'll continue making progress together.

A Survey to Share Your Lutheran Perspective

Dear friends in Christ,

Grace and peace to you during this season of Lent. It is a time when we, as Christians, reflect on our life together in Christ and the ways in which our identity in Christ is reflected in the world. Being able to articulate that identity can help guide us to a better understanding of ourselves and each other as God continues to call us to respond to the needs of the world.

There are many ways to reflect on our identity as Christians and Lutherans, one of which is by engaging each other across our global Lutheran family. As part of the Lutheran World Federation (LWF), we seek to contribute our North American Lutheran perspectives to the larger Lutheran tapestry, made up of 77 million members across 99 countries! And like the ELCA, the LWF has a rich history of theological study processes that can help us better understand ourselves and what it means to be church.

In 2019, the LWF launched a study process to explore the ways our global Lutheran identities are lived out through biblical interpretation, worship and the work of justice, peace and reconciliation. As a member of the LWF, the ELCA is taking part in this unique study process in a number of ways as we examine our Lutheran identity in our own context here in North America. We hope this process will allow us to experience the diverse ways our Lutheran tradition is being lived out. This is an opportunity to discern the ways in which we, in our own contexts, express law and gospel, faith and works, nature and grace, justification and sanctification, freedom and vocation – all parts of our common theological identity.

This Lent, I invite you to reflect on your Christian and Lutheran identities by participating in the Global Survey on Being Lutheran. We also ask that you invite others in your churches to participate. The survey will be open through March 31, and responses gathered will help to shape the 13th LWF Assembly in 2023.

In addition, between now and June you are invited to take part in a larger conversation that will transpire across the LWF communion. The LWF has produced a discussion guide titled *We Believe in the Holy Spirit: Welcome to a Global Conversation on Being Lutheran*. This guide will help lead your congregation's Christian education and/or youth group on a journey of mutual discovery and learning.

Thank you for sharing your insights and experiences. They will contribute to furthering our understanding of what being Lutheran means in this time and place as we continue to journey together in Christ through these next 500 years of reformation.

WEEKLY MILESTONES CARING CONVERSATIONS

Take a moment to tell or think about a recent mountain high and/or valley low in your life.

Discuss in your home, small group, or use for personal reflections:

- We often don't know important things about others. Who is someone you would like to learn more about? What would you like to ask them?
- Jesus' work as Savior comes through his rejection by others. Think or tell about a time when you were rejected. How did it make you feel?
- What do you learn about Jesus through his death on the cross?

DEVOTIONS

Read: Mark 14:1–15:47.

This long text creates its own devotional mood by walking with Jesus days prior to his death to his anguish in the garden, the trial, suffering, and crucifixion. There is much to choose from and you can consider for yourself what is meaningful to focus on. Is it the hospitality of Simon the leper or the adoration of an unnamed woman anointing Jesus? Is it Judas Iscariot and how we might betray Jesus today or be one of the deserting disciples who scatter like sheep? Do you identify with the disciples in Gethsemane, unable to stay awake for prayer along with Jesus during his time of anguish? How would it be to be a bystander like Simon of Cyrene who is drawn in to carry Jesus' cross? How is it that the centurion from the occupying forces of Rome is the only one to acknowledge Jesus with the words, "Truly this man was God's Son" (15:39)? What was it like for Joseph of Arimathea to take down Jesus' lifeless body and place it in a tomb? Or what other part of the account grips you this year? Whatever it is, reflect on Jesus' great love and sacrifice and our own need for Jesus as Savior. How do you honor Jesus as Savior today?

Pray: **For your great sacrifice and love, help us to adore you and witness to you as the Son of God and hope for the world. Amen.**

SERVICE

Do you know someone who will spend Easter alone? Consider sharing the resurrection joy by inviting that person to join you for a meal or call them to let them know that you are thinking about them.

RITUALS AND TRADITIONS

Palm Sunday is the day Christians remember Jesus entering Jerusalem. It signals the beginning of Holy Week. As the week begins, take time in your home to use palms received during worship or make palms out of construction paper and wave them to re-enact the crowds shouting as they met Jesus. As you wave the palms, imagine Jesus riding on a donkey past you and shout, "Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord" (John 12:13b).
